Greetings from the Mayor



The Village of Montebello is making changes today that will determine the nature and appearance of our Village for years to come. We are acting to preserve the nature and

quality of life of our residential neighborhood. Here, I will focus on five initiatives to provide you with a glimpse into our future.

First, we are taking actions to preserve open space and to make parkland more evident in the Village landscape. The park in Montebello Pines, once dedicated to the Village, will include walking paths, benches and a beautiful viewshed. We are currently completing an application to the NYS DEC to commence vitally needed dredging of the ponds. This project will remove 10,000 cubic yards of material from the ponds: enough to fill a one-acre lot to a height of 9 feet! Hundreds of thousands of dollars of developers' money has already been obtained by the Village and set aside for building the park once the dredging is completed. We hope to begin this project in the next year.

Other parks have or will be dedicated to the Village and preserved in a natural state. Coe Farm Park along Route 202 is being maintained to present a vista of the magnificent red barn that once was a part of the original farm. In the future, we hope to receive dedication of the open meadow across from the Fant estate as well as acres of forested land along Carroll Drive. At Village Hall a new ramp will provide handicapped access to the playground and a new 9/11 Memorial Garden has also been added. A dedication ceremony for the 9/11 Memorial Garden will be held on September 11th at 5:00PM and everyone is invited to attend.

Second, the vitality of our community will expand through the use of our new Community Center. The recently authorized purchase of the Reform Temple of Suffern (by more than a 4:1 majority) provides us with the opportunity for a wide variety of new activities. Civic, community, athletic, recreational, avocational, Senior Citizen, and governmental functions will all be supported at this center, thereby addressing the needs of a growing Village. The opportunity may also arise to create trails into the Harriman State Park accessible to the handicapped and to the elderly. We hope to open the doors to our new center by the end of this year.

Third, Montebello will be a local municipal leader in promoting green technologies to help reduce greenhouse gases while saving money. We have been awarded a \$32,000 grant from NYSERDA to build a solar electric system to help power Village Hall. We recently capped building permit fees for residential solar electric systems to promote the installation of photovoltaic systems in our Village. We also signed a petition drafted by the U.S. Conference Of Mayors to promote such initiatives. We are repairing Village Hall to create energy efficiency and we are also replacing outdoor streetlights across Montebello with new energy efficient bulbs.

Fourth, Montebello is preserving control of the manner in which the Village is developed. At a time when it seems as if many municipalities have abdicated or lost local zoning control, we are working on methods to strengthen ours. For example, the Village Board recently adopted an Open Space Plan to strategize priorities in preserving undeveloped space (available for review on our webpage). Currently, an Economic Development Commission is working on plans for a program that will guide our control of commercial properties. In 2008, we will initiate a 5-year review of our

Comprehensive Plan, seeking ways to enhance our ability to control development.

Fifth, Montebello is demonstrating the importance of active communication and input from the community. For example, our traffic calming program allows Villagers to request the installation of speed humps on their street. Our first installation, on Mayer Drive, was built at the request of the residents of that street. We also held the first-ever special election in Montebello to allow the citizens to decide whether to purchase a Community Center. More than 460 registered voters turned out to express their opinions. Affording everyone the opportunity to participate in the decision making process is a critical focus of our efforts.

Similarly, when we recently learned of the FAA's plan to reroute hundreds of flights inbound to Newark over our neighborhood we quickly proposed an alternative plan to the FAA, and reached out to the community. Montebello's proposal was lauded by various elected officials, demonstrating our leadership in the region. Utilizing phone calls, our webpage and emails, we made every effort to alert the community to the FAA's public meeting held on July 30th to provide everyone with an opportunity to comment on the record. Again, we are striving to enhance communication in an effort to yield superior results.

The cost and work associated with maintaining our Village is justified so long as we can control the development and the quality of our residential community life. I believe that this requires proactive planning, investment, communication and action. The Village is proceeding along this course; and the fruits of our labor should be evident in the years to come. Subject: Construction work being done without the

required Building Permit.

First, let me make you aware that a Building Permit is required for any construction, reconstruction, moving, demolition, structural alterations or any change in the use of a building or a structure. Any changes in the bulk of a building, a structure, or a non building use, but not including ordinary repairs which are not structural by nature and certain types of plumbing work also requires a building permit, in those cases it is at the discretion of the Building Inspector.

The Building Department is now in the process of examining approximately fifty (50 +) property files that have commenced construction, and did not file for a building permit. Violation notices will be sent out to the property owners with a certain amount of days given to correct the violation by filing for a building permit. Failure to do so will result in an appearance ticket being issued to appear in the Town of Ramapo Justice Court.

Most of the illegal construction being done without the required permits are;

- Accessory buildings one hundred forty four (144) square feet or more that are not considered a shed; a shed is a building less than one hundred forty four (144) square feet that does not require a building permit.
- Property fences
- Stone walls
- Signs
- Above ground swimming pools
- Conversion of a garage to a finished room.
- Hot tub/ Spas
- Enclosed deck
- Replacement of windows

- Enlargement of existing deck
- Replacement of an existing deck
- Demolition of existing buildings and structures
- Fire damage repairs
- Conversion of an unfinished basement to a finished basement considered to be habitable space, recreation room or storage room. This is also considered to be the most common violation as all of the work is being done within the dwelling and can not be observed from the exterior of the building but there are different ways that the Building Department can find out when a basement has been converted to habitable space, without the required building permit.

With this being said, I urge all of the property owners who have received Violation Notices in the past to come into the Building Department to correct the violations to prevent you from having to go to court, and pay a fine.

From the Village Attorney's Desk

It struck me while absorbing the goings on at the Torne Valley FAA meeting that, once again, here was our little Village, via its leaders, taking a position at the forefront. By that I don't mean getting on the apple-pie-and-mother-hood bandwagon when it has become safe and PC to do so, but taking early initiative.

The setting and circumstances caused me to remember that it was Montebello which had the foresight to formally intervene in the Torne Valley power plant proceedings. Indeed, we lent our shoes to the Town and this was a major factor in helping to stop the plants.

The more I thought about it the more I convinced myself that that quality - creative initiative - is emblematic of Montebello and its citizens. Thus, it is no surprise that it has been consistently reflected in the actions of the present and all past administrations (including our Mayors, Trustees, boards and commissions, staff and professionals).

Early manifestations of the Village's creative initiative occurred in the Village formation era, and shortly thereafter. We chose our boundaries to include land with the potential for affordable housing, and then were able to find a developer willing to construct same in return for being able to establish a shopping center on the corner portion of the parcel. This became, of course, Indian Rock. Another early example was adopting a land use approval moratorium while our Zoning Commission studied the Town's zoning laws, having built in an appeals procedure in the interests of justice. It is my impression that our local law became a model for other new villages - I know for sure of its current use upstate.

There are many similar examples. A few that I can think of in our early - middle years include wide spread use of conservation easements to create green belt buffers, adopting a tree law (and refining same) to prevent the wholesale denuding of our greenery, and placing the wheels in motion to ultimately acquire and develop The Ponds Park. We also were creative in establishing a Parks Commission which has given us the tot lot, the Adirondack-style pavilion, various events, attractive signage and general beautification, with the aforementioned Park yet to come. Certainly, also significant is the Village Board - Parks Commission - Eagle Scout (thank you, Peter!) cooperation yielding the 911 Memorial Garden (to be dedicated this September 11th at 5 pm). Along the same lines was the foresight to acquire the Village Hall, then the surrounding land, and, jumping to the current administration, the renovation project presently underway to improve efficiency and preserve the structure in phases while the staff continues to function.

Turning back to our middle to later years, initiatives worthy of mention include the two-year effort leading to the Comprehensive Plan, and taking over the building department function. Bridging the gap between the prior and current administration was creating the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) with more recent emphasis leading to designation of three historic properties to date: the Montebello Park mansion and environs; the Johnson farm home; and, the Fant Estate. These designations should yield significant benefits for current and future generations. Indeed, villages with an HPC are few in

Turning to the modern era, examples of initiatives abound. Not only is the present administration pushing hard to be certain that the HPC and the Parks

Commission achieve and maintain significant roles, but the Ponds Park actually approaches concrete steps towards coming into being, and the initiative is well underway to acquire the former Reform Temple of Suffern property (but only after submitting the issue to public referendum, it passing by 82% in favor). As to the latter, I suspect that this will prove to be a very important and useful acquisition over time. Looking around, the speed humps recently constructed on Mayer Drive, and the associated neighborhood petitioning procedure, are unique in the County, if not the State. We have obtained a grant to construct a solar energy facility at the Village Hall which will supply about one-third of its electrical power needs, and I believe this is unique in the County. We have also obtained a FEMA grant for storm restoration work on Bayard Lane, and the Mayor and our grant writer are pro-actively seeking significant grants in various other areas.

Lastly, regarding keeping the public informed, our Village Board meetings are now televised on Cablevision channel 78 on Sundays, and our website has been reformatted and evolves on an almost daily basis.

Simply put, we are a Village whose citizens tend to be creative thinkers who take initiative. Assuming I am correct, it is no surprise that our local government, made up of our citizens, has exhibited the same trait from its inception.

Enjoy the lazy days of summer. Be sure to take the time to lie on your back in the grass, hands folded under head, and gaze at the sky while doing what Montebellians do best: pondering, and dreaming of new initiatives!

On July 10, 2007 the Village held a special election to determine whether to authorize a bond of up to \$1.2 million dollars for the purchase of the former site of the Reform Temple of Suffern to be used as a Community Center. The results were: 375 (82%) in favor, 83 (18%) opposed.

community clean by policing the streets for litter and reporting dumping to the local authorities. It was also discovered during the cleanup day that grass clippings, leaves and other landscape material are being dumped on parkland and Village easements, report those these findings to Village Hall. This is our community and keeping it clean is everyone's responsibility.


FAA flight plans and Montebello

The FAA's proposed changes to regional flight traffic will have a real impact on Rockland. Montebello offered the FAA an option that would improve upon their plan by shifting the flight corridor over parkland, thereby lessening the noise experienced in the most densely populated residential communities.

The FAA has spent several years and millions of dollars reconfiguring the route of planes to the major airports in our

region. New navigation technology will allow planes to fly planes along much narrower corridors than those currently in use. This will result in a greater capacity to handle more aircraft at area airports, reducing delays. The FAA proposes that when flights are landing at Newark from the north, they will pass over Rockland.

The flights over Rockland would enter the county at approximately 10,000 feet and exit the county at 5,500 feet. This will increase the level of noise experienced on the ground. The FAA claims that this noise increase won't be significant and won't affect property values. They claim that a public hearing was not even required in Rockland.



When the head of the FAA's redesign project, Steve Kelley, appeared at the Ramapo Town Hall forum, he presented the plan as a fait accompli. Montebello's proposal takes advantage of the sparsely populated area along the I-287 thruway route south from Harriman. Since the FAA's stated goal is to mitigate the noise experienced on the ground, this suggestion would actually improve their plan.

On July 30, the FAA held another forum at the St. Lawrence Center at the request of Congressman Engel. At that forum, the public and the elected officials strongly opposed the FAA plan and most people supported our proposal. The FAA remained reluctant to consider adjusting their plan in any way. In addition to placing our comments on the record, we have written to Congressman Engel and Senators Clinton and Schumer imploring them to demand that the FAA seriously consider alternatives. If this request fails, then legal action to block implementation of the entire plan may be the last resort available.

Speed Humps unveiled in Montebello

The Village's first speed humps were installed on Mayer Drive in August. Three humps were placed at the request of the residents of this road in order to calm traffic. Montebello allows citizens to request the installation of speed humps. Information is available on our website. Residents are encouraged to visit Mayer Drive to see these humps in order to decide whether they would like them on their block.

Bucolic Montebello Beset by Challenges by Steven Sorrillo, Trustee



At times it seems as if bucolic Montebello is beset on all sides by challenges to our quality of life. One of these challenges may be a proposal to replace the Tappan Zee Bridge that could have an impact upon Montebello. Another challenge is the plan by the FAA to reroute aircraft over our region. Both of the plans require the

active involvement of your Village Board as well as every member of the public.

A number of agencies are working on plans to replace the Tappan Zee bridge and a final proposal has not yet reached the Governor's desk. Recently the Montebello Board of Trustees attended a workshop with the Regional Planning Association (RPA) to review their proposal. We learned that their plan includes transportation options that call for a rail system extending from Westchester County (under the new bridge) and across Rockland County to the Village of Suffern. At some points in Rockland this rail system would travel below ground, at some points at ground level, and in certain other areas would be elevated.

The RPA also proposes a rail station in Montebello at the junction of Airmont Road and the New York State Thruway at the 14B exit. This station, and several miles of tracks leading to and away from it, would be elevated approximately twenty feet above ground. This is not an acceptable plan to the Village of Montebello.

A train station would be an eyesore and the noise and air pollution that would come with it would diminish the quality of life we have come to enjoy. In addition, traffic congestion would only become worse. The R.P.A. has also proposed to change the configuration of the 14B exit. This change would have the exit ramp begin some distance further back down the Thruway and be elevated over Airmont Road and over the station by an additional twenty feet.


When I asked about the aesthetics of their proposal I was told to think "Los Angeles". The R.P.A. representatives seemed surprised that we in Montebello, as well as our neighbors in Airmont, were adamantly against their proposal. We made our opinions loud and clear. We will strongly fight against the R.P.A.'s proposal. The good news is that such a project would cost more money than anyone could imagine and there is little in the way of available funds. Therefore, it is unlikely that this proposal will ever be enacted. Nevertheless, the price of our quality of life is "eternal vigilence".

On a similar note, we learned that another agency is pressing down on us from above. The Federal Aviation Administration has a plan in process to reroute incoming flights to Newark Airport over certain parts of Rockland including Montebello. These flights would fly at an altitude of as little as five thousand feet, low enough to interfere with normal conversation loud enough to drive us all inside (and maybe a little crazy). The quality of our air may also be impacted. Due to the proximity of the thruway, our air quality is not now what it should be and this proposal would only make things worse.

Some of this sounds like doom and gloom, but maybe that is just what we need to overcome our apathy. It is up to us, all of us, to do something about these problems. We shouldn't just wring our hands and accept what is forced upon us. For many of us our homes are our single biggest investment and need to be protected. Your Mayor and Trustees are involved. We attend these meetings and we voice our opinions. However, this is not enough. You must get involved. Contact your elected officials in Albany and Washington. Tell them how you feel and what you want them to do. Additionally if you feel there are things that we could do better, please feel free to contact us.

Rio Vista @ Montebello has received Final approval, but the Architectural Review is still in process.

Fant Subdivision received preliminary approval and is now in the process of obtaining a Wetlands Permit and final approval.

Info USA – Site Plan: the proposal is to build an office building on one of the three remaining vacant lots on Rella Boulevard.

Emerald Pines - Preliminary Subdivision is for a four lot subdivision on Viola Road.

Condon - Preliminary Subdivision for a four lot subdivision off of Route 202.
